John 1:19-28



Passage:

¹⁹ And this is the testimony of John, when the Jews sent priests and Levites from Jerusalem to ask him, "Who are you?" ²⁰ He confessed, and did not deny, but confessed, "I am not the Christ." ²¹ And they asked him, "What then? Are you Elijah?" He said, "I am not." "Are you the Prophet?" And he answered, "No." ²² So they said to him, "Who are you? We need to give an answer to those who sent us. What do you say about yourself?" ²³ He said, "I am the voice of one crying out in the wilderness, 'Make straight the way of the Lord,' as the prophet Isaiah said."

²⁴ (Now they had been sent from the Pharisees.) ²⁵ They asked him, "Then why are you baptizing, if you are neither the Christ, nor Elijah, nor the Prophet?" ²⁶ John answered them, "I baptize with water, but among you stands one you do not know, ²⁷ even he who comes after me, the strap of whose sandal I am not worthy to untie." ²⁸ These things took place in Bethany across the Jordan, where John was baptizing.

 John the Baptist – cousin of Jesus (son of Zechariah and Elizabeth, sister of Mary mother of Jesus), baptized for the repentance of sins. Elijah- a prophet who turned people back to God and was expected to return before the Messiah's coming (Malachi 4:5) Prophet – An expected prophet, like Moses, who could also be the Messiah (Deuteronomy 18:15). Main Idea:

The testimony about John the Baptist shows the spiritual climate around Jerusalem at the time. The Jews were clearly looking for God to speak once again to His people and John the Baptist was finally a prophet that was working on behalf of God's Kingdom. Intrigued, the religious leaders question John seeking to see if he is the Messiah, Elijah, or **the** Prophet who was promised. However, John answers them that he is merely the forerunner, the Messiah is coming.

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
